Time to act for SDG 8: Integrating decent work, sustained growth and environmental integrity

The report seeks to improve understanding of Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 8 at the empirical, conceptual and policy levels by: (a) charting empirical progress towards the 12 targets under SDG 8 and comparing performance across country income groups; (b) developing a conceptual mapping of dynamic interlinkages between SDG 8 targets and specific targets under other SDGs, and exploring on that basis major patterns of achievement in the various world regions; and (c) describing a positive spiral of policy interventions and institutional support that can enable countries to achieve SDG 8 by 2030. The report of the Global Commission on the Future of Work and the [ILO Centenary Declaration](#) focus attention on strengthening the capabilities of all people to benefit from the opportunities of a changing world of work through lifelong learning (LLL). The report builds on its predecessor, Skills for green jobs: A global view, published by the ILO in 2011. This new edition presents an expanded qualitative analysis, with coverage of several additional countries and regions. It is a ground-breaking piece of empirical research and modelling, providing new insights into the likely impact of occupational skills on declining and growing industries by 2030 based on two global quantitative scenarios. 

International Labour Conference Thematic Forums, Palais des Nations, Geneva, Switzerland:

- [Jobs and skills for a brighter future. 14 June.](#) The session explored the linkages between jobs, skills and the policy reforms needed to support future just transitions in the labour market.
- [Securing sustainable transitions over the life course. 14 June.](#) Participants in the forum discussed how digitalization, demographic shifts, climate change and globalization will affect the way people manage transitions over the course of their lives.
- [Multilateralism for an equitable future of work, Tuesday, 18 June.](#) The session examined what needs to be done at the international and regional levels to reduce inequality and how the multilateral system can work together in a more coherent manner.

ILO100 YOUTH DEBATE: Young leaders and labour market transitions. 13 June. Palais des Nations. Geneva, Switzerland.

The debate brought together young leaders from across the globe to share their views about key elements that impact young persons' transitions to and within the labour market. It focused attention on decent work and productive employment from the perspective of the school-to-work transition; technological change, including new forms of work and lifelong learning; and, gender equality and rights. Launch: Decent Jobs for Youth knowledge facility. 1 August. Abuja, Nigeria.

The knowledge facility of the Global Initiative on Decent Jobs for Youth will be launched at the [Global Youth Employment Forum - Today and tomorrow with Decent Jobs for Youth](#) - in Abuja. The facility aims to support evidence-informed country-level action for tangible impact on decent work for youth. It will serve as a meta-website for mapping and linking knowledge on youth employment while strengthening national capacity for the design, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of youth employment policies and programmes. WorldSkills Conference 2019: Skills for change: Building blocks for impact. 23-24 August. Kazan, Russia.

This August Kazan will be the skills capital of the world as the city hosts the WorldSkills Competition. 1,400 young people from around the globe will compete to be world champions in 56 different skills.

Alongside the Competition, the WorldSkills Conference will ask pressing questions for our sector, including: How can we train an agile generation of skilled young people for the future? How will they stay relevant in the face of economic, social and technological transformations? 18th African Regional Seminar for Labour-Based Practitioners – “Towards sustainable and inclusive local development: local resource-based approaches and decent job creation”. 9-13 September. Tunis, Tunisia.

Organized by the Government of Tunisia in partnership with the ILO, the seminar, which includes ministers from different branches of government, will review progress since their 2017 Addis Ababa Ministerial Declaration and discuss possible improvements to expand impact within their countries and the region contributing to the African Union Commission’s Agenda 2063. Over the five days, an estimated 500 seminar participants will, through different plenaries, parallel sessions, groups and exhibitions, share, discuss and evaluate ideas, knowledge and experiences in terms of policies, practices and technologies with a high potential for employment creation, and decent and quality work. Massive Open Online Course on Recommendation No. 205: Employment and Decent Work for Peace and Resilience. 23 September - 18 October. Enrolment deadline: 4 October.

This Massive Open Online Course (MOOC), jointly organized by the Employment Policy Department and ITC/ILO, focuses on raising awareness about ILO Recommendation No. 205 on Employment and Decent Work for Peace and Resilience (2017). Recommendation 205 is the only international normative framework providing guidance for addressing world-of-work issues in response to crisis situations. The course provides participants with information and practical knowledge about policies, approaches, tools, methodologies and case studies that can be used to promote employment and decent work measures that prevent crises, enable recovery and build peace and resilience. The course targets government officials, ILO constituents, partners and staff, and development practitioners working at the nexus of humanitarian and development assistance with a focus on employment and decent work in crisis response. [Training course on creating productive jobs and promoting productivity growth through structural transformation. 14-18 October. Turin, Italy.](#)

This course, jointly organized by the Employment Policy Department and ITC/ILO, focuses on the relationship between the creation of decent work and structural transformation and productivity growth. Among the topics to be presented and discussed will be: conducive macroeconomic, sectoral and labour market policies for structural transformation and full and productive employment, including the aspects of youth and gender; methods for identifying potentially promising sectors; sectoral approaches to skills development; employment impact assessments of public investments and policies; and, transitions to formality.
