

What are the Guidelines for Combating Child **Labour Among ITPs?**

Guidelines to combat child labour among ITPs which meet ITPs' specific needs through a right-based approach, in use since 2006

For whom?

- **Direct beneficiaries:** ILO staff, partners such as governments, workers' and employers' organizations, development partners, civil society organizations, local organizations
- Ultimate beneficiaries: ITPs, working children

For what purpose?

Provide practical guidance on how to address the specific needs and rights of indigenous peoples, and thus combat child labour among indigenous children


How is it delivered?
