Happy International Youth Day!

The theme for this year's International Youth Day is "Dialogue and Mutual Understanding". The choice of the theme reflects the General Assembly's appreciation of the value of dialogue among youth from different cultures as well as among different generations, and is in line with the theme of this International Year of Youth. As part of the International Year of Youth, the General Assembly held a high-level meeting on youth on 25 and 26 July 2011. POSTCARD FROM...Indonesia

Apa Kabar? Greetings from the beautiful archipelago of Indonesia! More than 238 million people, including a large youth population, call our 17,500 islands stretched across three different time zones home. With our economy experiencing robust and steady growth to the tune of 6 per cent annually,



we need to ensure that this translates into decent and productive employment opportunities for youth while enabling an entrepreneurial culture in new and exciting sectors like the creative industries and green enterprises.

With a third of employed youth still work in low productivity non-wage labour and more than half of them working in the informal sector, youth are working in a vulnerable environment without any social protection, and with decent work deficits measured in terms of working poverty and employment status. But on the bright side, the trends indicate that youth unemployment is declining: from 2007 to 2010, the unemployment rate dropped by about a quarter.

You will be pleased to hear that a growing number of 'movers and shakers' are committed to tackling the youth employment challenge in Indonesia. At the 100th annual International Labour Conference in Geneva recently, President Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono called for a Global Coalition for Youth Employment. Supported by the ILO and World Bank, the Vice President's Office for Acceleration of Poverty Reduction team is currently designing a Youth Employment Strategy 2011-2014 based on existing programmes and activities implemented by various ministries. The Indonesia Youth Employment Network (IYEN) Secretariat will lend its coordination and knowledge sharing expertise to the upcoming Strategy.

In line with the International Youth Day celebration, the MDG Fund Joint Programme on Alternatives to Migration: Decent Work for Filipino Youth is organizing an event entitled "Kabataan: Jobs and Alternatives to Migration" or KA JAM.
